Chmielewski P. New locality of lady orchid Orchis purpurea Huds. near Tomaszów Lubelski (E Poland)

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Lady orchid is a protected species classified as vulnerable (VU) in the Polish Red Data Book. It was previously reported from 5 localities in the Lublin Province, only three of which have been confirmed in 2006-2007. A new locality of O. purpurea was discovered near Chorażanka village (GF14 square of the ATPOL grid) in 2006. Twenty specimens of O. purpurea grow on a calcareous slope together with: Cytisus nigricans, Brachypodium pinnatum, Euphorbia cyparissias, Melampyrum arvense, Cichorium intybus, Origanum vulgare, Fragaria viridis, Agrimonia eupatoria, Salvia verticillata, Picris hieracioides, Centaurea scabiosa, Medicago falcata, Anemone sylvestris, Primula veris, Melittis melissophyllum, Platanthera chlorantha, Cephalanthera damasonium, Cypripedium calceolus, Orchis militaris, Orobanche lutea and Muscari comosum. The main threat to this locality is the overgrowth of the grassland with trees, bushes and dominative species as Calamagrostis epigejos and Rubus sp. Picking and digging out lady orchid plants though not observed, can pose a great threat as well. The occurrence of numerous orchids and other rare plant species makes this locality worthy of protection. Therefore, in February 2008 it was proposed as special area of conservation of the Natura 2000 network.
